



Voiced th /ð/

Formation: Place the tip of the tongue between the upper and lower front incisors, with the mouth slightly open. Blow air stream to cause friction. Use voice. This is the tongue buzzer sound: "th-th-th-th."

Between the ages of $6\frac{1}{2}$ and 7 years most children have acquired and stabilized this sound.

The instructions for voiceless th (θ) should be used, except the use of the "speech motor" in producing the phoneme will be stressed. The clinician should adapt syllables from θ , being sure they are voiced for this sound.

The most common substitutions are the /v/ and the /d/. Occasionally a client will utilize /z/ for δ .
