She Was An Ice Cube

Many poets use figures of speech to enrich their poetry. Three common figures of speech are *similes*, *metaphors*, and *personification*.

- A **simile** describes something by saying that it is like another thing. It often uses *like* or as. For example: *My face was as red as an apple.*
- A metaphor describes something by saying that it is another thing (figuratively speaking). For example: The road is a twisting snake.
- **Personification** describes a nonhuman object as if it had human characteristics. For example: *The flowers danced in the breeze.*
