NoroVirus Viral Gastroenteritis

Description:

Gastroenteritis (stomach flu) with sudden onset of the following symptoms

- Vomiting, more often in children
- Watery, non-bloody diarrhea with abdominal (stomach) cramps
- Nausea
- Occasionally fever, chills, headache, muscle aches
- Dehydration may occur, especially in the young and elderly

How is it spread?

- Virus
- Spread primarily by fecal-oral route (eating or drinking contaminated food/water)
- · By touching an object contaminated and putting hands or fingers in mouth
- By having direct contact with someone who is infected

What to expect:

- Lasts for 1-10 days
- No serious long-term complications for most people

Is it contagious?

- Yes
- Both stool and vomit are infectious
- Illness usually occurs between 1-2 days after exposure

How is it diagnosed and treated?

- Physician evaluation with lab confirmation of stool samples
- Treatment is aimed at symptom relief, along with fluid replacement and correction of electrolyte imbalances, if necessary

Should the sick child be isolated?

Yes

When can the child return to day care or school?

 The child may return when they are symptom free and feel well, upon recommendation from their primary care provider

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Preventing the spread of gastroenteritis

- Wash hands frequently
- Wash and prepare food properly
- Clean contaminated surfaces after an illness episode with bleach-based household cleaner thoroughly
- Wash contaminated clothing or linen immediately
- Offer sick leave for those who are ill; food handlers should not be allowed to handle food until at least 3 days after recovery from illness
